EXPLANATORY NOTE

State Street Corporation is filing this Amendment No. 1 on Form 8-K/A to its Current Report on Form 8-K dated January 27, 2016 solely for the purpose of disclosing under Item 2.05 of Form 8-K additional estimates regarding which it has now made a determination in connection with its State Street Beacon multi-year transformation program. This Amendment No. 1 does not otherwise revise the January 27, 2016 Form 8-K in any way.

Item 2.05. Costs Associated with Exit or Disposal Activities.

On January 27, 2016, State Street announced expected restructuring costs associated with State Street Beacon, our multi-year transformation program intended to achieve efficiencies and further digitize our interfaces with our clients. To implement State Street Beacon, we expect to incur aggregate future pre-tax restructuring charges of approximately \$300 million to \$400 million beginning in 2016 through December 31, 2020. We estimate those charges will include approximately \$250 million to \$300 million in severance and benefits costs associated with targeted staff reductions (a substantial portion of which will result in future cash expenditures) and approximately \$50 million to \$100 million in information technology application rationalization and real estate actions. Included within these estimates is a charge of approximately \$100 million we expect to record in the first quarter of 2016, approximately \$90 million of which we expect to be for severance and benefits costs.

- •increases in the volatility of, or declines in the level of, our net interest revenue, changes in the composition or valuation of the assets recorded in our consolidated statement of condition (and our ability to measure the fair value of investment securities) and the possibility that we may change the manner in which we fund those assets;

 •adverse changes in the regulatory ratios that we are required or will be required to meet, whether arising under the Dodd-Frank Act or the Basel III final rule, or due to changes in regulatory positions, practices or regulations in jurisdictions in which we engage in banking activities, including changes in internal or external data, formulae, models, assumptions or other advanced systems used in the calculation of our capital ratios that cause changes in those
- •increasing requirements to obtain the prior approval of the Federal Reserve or our other U.S. and non-U.S. regulators for the use, allocation or distribution of our capital or other specific capital actions or programs, including acquisitions, dividends and stock purchases, without which our growth plans, distributions to shareholders, share repurchase programs or other capital initiatives may be restricted;
- •changes in law or regulation, or the enforcement of law or regulation, that may adversely affect our business activities or those of our clients or our counterparties, and the products or services that we sell, including additional or increased taxes or assessments thereon, capital adequacy requirements, margin requirements and changes that expose us to risks related to the adequacy of our controls or compliance programs;
